Normal meeting activity will begin again in September.





Hemlandsnytt

News from the homeland

A column of current Swedish news topics, taken from Swedish news media. They do not reflect the opinions of the Swedish Cultural Center.

Graduation: Crown Princess Victoria can put the study books away now, with the arrival of summer break. She was among 19 students from the Ministry for Foreign Affaires' diplomatic education classes who recently passed their exams.

Happy birthday: Sweden's youngest princess is now a little older. On June 10, she turned 25 and was royally celebrated by hundreds of well-wishers at the Royal Castle in Stockholm.

Crack down: Swedes will no longer be able to snoop through each others' finances anonymously, after a popular web site agreed to tighten the rules on its credit information services. The site, <u>ratsit.se</u>, allows users to browse the income and other personal information on all Swedes, free of charge. Now, after pressure from the national tax authority, it will impose new restrictions.

Rock 'n roll: The Swedish National Tax Board rejected a couple's application to name their 6 month-old daughter "Metallica", explaining that the name's association with the download-hating rock 'n roll storm troopers and "metal" were unacceptable. Still faced with the task of naming their little Iron Maiden, the parents may consider the name of some other rock act.

RIP: One of Swedish most popular artists, Povel Ramel, passed away recently in his home. He was born in Stockholm in 1922 and acted as composer, pianist, revue star and author. Among many other awards, he became honorary doctor at the University of Stockholm in 1998.

Another first: Sweden became the first country to open an embassy in the virtual world. "Second Life", an Internet based world where users create characters known as avatars, is run by Linden Lab, based in San Francisco. Created to promote the Swedish state's image and culture, the embassy does not offer any real or virtual consular services but does provide information on its real world counterparts

Trapped: A driver on his way home found that the motor was difficult to shift. He pulled up to a service station in Örebro and when he opened the hood he realized what the problem was – a cat was stuck in the engine compartment. When he couldn't get the cat out, the rescue corps was called. The rescue operation was a complicated history as only one paw and the tip of the tail were visible. In the beginning, the cat did not cooperate with the rescue folks — but, after the removal of some hardware and receiving some calming medication, the cat agreed to be rescued.
