Recognition Dinner & Tribute for the Founders of Swedish Hospital Saturday, April 21

The Swedish Cultural Center is pleased to honor the founders of Swedish Hospital, and their descendants, with a special Recognition Dinner and Tribute on Saturday evening, April 21.

In 1908 a courageous group of 11 visionaries founded Swedish Hospital. Eight in this group were also presidents of *Svenska Klubben* (or the Swedish Club, which is now the Swedish Cultural Center). These giants in Seattle's early Swedish history include: Nils A. Johanson, M.D.; Andrew Chilberg; P. A. Hallberg; J. A. Soderberg; John Kalberg; Godfrey Chealander; N. J. Nyquist; Emil Lovegren; Israel Nelson; Gustaf Axel Edelsvard and H. E. Turner.

Swedish immigrants participated in the young and growing city of Seattle in many ways, but one of the greatest marks belongs to these pioneers who set a high standard for Seattle's health care 100 years ago.

This gala event starts at 6 p.m. and will feature a lavish, traditional Swedish dinner catered by *Kaspar's* and include music by Swedish opera singer Marie Birve and pianist Lisa Bergman.

In addition, a number of prominent guests will attend and speak at this once-in-a-century event, including: the Swedish Consul General from Los Angeles, Tomas Rosander; outgoing Executive Director of the Nordic Heritage Museum, Marianne Forssblad (one of her last official tasks before retiring to Sweden); Swedish Medical Center Trustee, Ned Turner (whose grandfather H. E. Turner was a hospital founder) and the new CEO of Swedish Medical Center, Rodney Hochman, M.D. Co-chairs for the event are former SCC Board President Bert Lundh and Board member Susan Ramstead.

SCC Film Series Features Finland April 1

On Sunday, April 1, the Swedish Cultural Center Film Series will feature "Mother of Mine", a 2005 film set in World War II-era Sweden and Finland. Directed by Klaus Härö, the film is based on a novel by Heikki Hietamies.

"Mother of Mine" — whose title in Swedish is "Den bästa av mödrar" and in Finnish is "Äideistä parhain" — tells the story of nine-year-old Eero. The boy is one of more than 70,000 Finnish citizens evacuated from their war-torn country to neutral Sweden during the Second World War. While Eero feels more and more abandoned by his biological Finnish mother, he is not yet attached to his Swedish surrogate mom. When he is returned to Finland, his confusion only intensifies.

The film will be shown at 1:00 p.m. in Swedish and Finnish with English subtitles.

Academy Award Nominee Is April “Film From Finland”

In 2006, Finland’s entry became one of the five nominees for Best Foreign Film. While *Äideistä parhain* (Mother of Mine) did not win the Oscar, it won legions of fans in the United States and elsewhere. It is the April 25 selection in the “Films from Finland” series at the Swedish Cultural Center.

While the story of the 70,000 “war children” who left Finland during its Winter and Continuation Wars is not well known internationally, it obviously resonates with audiences everywhere as they follow one homesick Finnish boy as he joins a Swedish family, the mother of whom is reluctant to accept him. For her powerful portrayal of the Swedish mother, Maria Lundqvist, won a Jussi – the Finnish equivalent of the Oscar, but all the performances in the film are strong, as are the excellent production values. Set design, costumes, and cinematography all successfully recreate the period, while the musical score makes its own significant contribution.

Like other fourth Wednesday films in this series, “Mother of Mine” begins as 7:30 PM. It is 104 minutes in length and is suitable for adults and teens. In Finnish and Swedish, the movie has English subtitles. A \$5.00 suggested donation is accepted at the door.

Leading Swedish Crime Writers to Visit SCC May 3

If you like to read mysteries or crime fiction, you may have noticed that the work of more and more Nordic authors in this genre is being published in English. On Thursday, May 3, Swedish Cultural Center will host an appearance by not just one, but four of Sweden’s leading crime writers.

The four writers – Håkan Nesser, Helene Turstén, Kjell Eriksson, and Inger Frimansson – will be on a North American tour that includes New York, Toronto, Los Angeles and San Francisco, and which concludes right here in Seattle, at the SCC. Each of the four authors has a new book appearing in English translation this spring. (The first book by Inger Frimansson to be published in English, *Goodnight My Darling*, has been translated by SCC member Laura Wideburg.)

At this free event (which starts at 7:00 p.m.), the authors will discuss their books and be available to sign copies. Seattle Mystery Bookshop will make the authors’ books available for purchase, and several other Swedish organizations – SWEA, Swedish Cultural Society (*Svenska Kulturförbundet*), the Swedish Program at the University of Washington, and STiNA (Swedish Translators in North America) – will provide refreshments for the occasion.

Hemlandsnytt

News from the homeland

A column of current Swedish news topics, taken from Swedish news media. They do not reflect the opinions of the Swedish Cultural Center.

Fuel: Volvo and Saab are skeptical when it comes to methanol as an alternative automobile fuel. Methanol is poisonous, dangerous to handle and gives shorter driving distance per gallon of fuel. The car makers are now focusing solely on Ethanol, which is a more eco-friendly than Methanol.

Smart lights: Göteborg is converting to more intelligent street lights which – depending on the different seasons, weather and traffic situations – will be operated automatically, using sensors and network techniques.

Grants: Swedish researchers will receive SEK 20 million (about \$ 3 million) from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to be used to find a vaccine against HIV. The Gates Foundation currently gives money to 16 worldwide vaccine projects for a total of \$ 300 mil. The Swedish recipients are Rigmor Thorstensson, docent of immunology, and Gunnel Biberfeld, Professor Emeritus in clinical immunology.

Champeen of the World: The Swede's scored their biggest victory ever for a Swedish male golfer, as Henrik Stenson won the World Golf Championship in Arizona, recently. Stenson played the final against the title holder Geoff Ogilvy of Australia, winning the match on the 35th hole.

Longevity: A study by the EU Commission shows that Swedish men live, on average, longer than their European brothers. They also are able to work longer, age-wise. Sweden is the country where men have the longest expected average length of life, about 78 years, compared to Latvia's and Lithuania's 65-66 years.

Vacation spots: During 2006, the most popular place for Swedes to visit was the Canary Islands, according to the Swedish CAA. The most popular cities outside of Europe were New York, with 122,429 visitors, and Bangkok, with 76,538 visitors.

More studies: According to a British-American study, Swedes are the people in Europe who feel best, thanks to low blood pressure. Sweden ended up highest ranked on the list measuring so-called "blood pressure-related well being", followed by Denmark and England. A total of 15,000 randomly selected people from 15 west and central European countries were asked questions regarding lifestyle, quality of life, mental health and blood pressure levels. This study will soon be published by The National Bureau of Economic Research, USA.
