Summer Hiking Tour in Sweden and Norway

For a different way to see Sweden and Norway – a hiking tour following in the footsteps of 18th Century Swedish naturalist Carl Linnæus – consider a two-week tour in the summer of 2008 being organized by Seminars International. Longtime Gustavus Adolphus College professor (and University of Washington graduate) Roland Thorstenson will lead the tour, together with two Gustavus alumni, Daniel Lundberg (Class of 1998) and Julia Paraskova (Class of 1999) who now live in Sweden. The tour, scheduled for July 20 to August 3, will begin in Uppsala and then head north to areas visited and described by Linnæus on a journey in 1732.

A native of Småland (like Linnæus), Professor Thorstenson has led many groups of visiting Swedes on tours of the Upper Midwest, and has traveled extensively in northern Sweden and Norway (sometimes on cross-country skis). Most recently he retraced Linnæus's travels together with nature photographer Anders Björling in the summer of 2006.

We shine the spotlight on current SCC Board members

Randy Nelson, SCC Board member

Randy Nelson is a native of Montana. His grandparents, including Emma Thorén from Hälsingland, were immigrants from Denmark, Norway, and Sweden. He is working to organize the Center's library, where the Board plans to launch a genealogy service and collection. “Producing Adults” is Next Up in “Films from Finland”

The monthly “Films from Finland” series continues on February 27 at 7:30 p.m. in the Swedish Cultural Center with “Lapsia ja aikuisia” (Producing Adults) – a comedy-drama about the joys and sorrows of producing children.

This 2004 film, literally translated as “Children and Adults,” focuses on a superficially happy couple divided over the issue of whether or not to have a child.

“Lapsia ja aikuisia” marks the directorial debut of Akseli Salmenperä, whose 2007 film “Miehen työ” (A Man's Work) generated much critical buzz and controversy in its depiction of male prostitution. Salmenperä received a Jussi nomination for his first work – one of eight nominations received by the film. It was also Finland's official entry in the Best Foreign Film category for Academy Award.

“Lapsia ja aikuisia” is in Finnish, with English subtitles. It carries a rating of K-11, roughly the equivalent of a strong PG-13. Running time is 102 minutes. A \$5.00 donation is requested at the door.

“Films from Finland” is sponsored by Finlandia Foundation Seattle Chapter. Films in the series are shown on the fourth Wednesday of each month, with the exception of July and August. For a complete 2008 schedule of films, visit the FFSC website at FFSC@finns.org

Hemlandsnytt

News from the homeland

A column of current Swedish news topics, taken from Swedish news media. They do not reflect the opinions of the Swedish Cultural Center.

Huge moose: A 45 meter (148 ft) wooden moose with a restaurant in the stomach and a viewing deck in the horns will attract tourists to Svansäle in Norrland. Called "Storn", which means 'big moose' in Norrlandish dialect, it features an elevator in a pine trunk which will bring visitors to the entrance in its mouth, where the reception and stores are. From there, visitors will wander down through the neck to the stomach, which will be home to a concert hall, art exhibitions, restaurant and a conference facility.

Royal stuff: King Carl XVI Gustaf wants to build three cottages in the Vinde Mountains Nature Reservation. The reason is that Crown Princess Victoria, Princess Madeleine and Prince Carl Philip need their own getaway nests when they visit the mountains. The average commoner is forbidden from building on national parks or reservations, but it remains to be seen if the King will be able to get the okay.

Flora: During the year of Linnaeus, 2007, Swedes voted for the most beautiful Swedish wild flower. A total of 220 flowers were listed in the competition and the 28 flowers with the most votes went to the finals. The winner, with 13 % of the votes, was the Lily of the Valley; it was followed by the white Water Lily and the Twinflower (Linnea).

Technology: The Swedish company, Portendo, has invented a new technique that can be used in detecting hidden explosives at a distance. This technique was presented at the large safety exhibition, Intersec, in Dubai – the event gathered more than 800 exhibits from 53 countries. Portendo is owned by a small number of private persons who, since 2005, have worked on developing laser-based techniques to meet the growing need to detect explosives from a distance.

Ouch: One Swedish flagger had a guardian angel with a great patience, having been run over three times while on his watch. At the annual New Year's running event Sylvesterloppet, in Göteborg, flaggers were hired to prevent contact between the runners and cars. With traffic at a standstill, one driver lost his patience and started passing the lineup. When the flagger stepped out to prevent the driver from crossing over, the driver hit the man, who was thrown to the ground. He managed to get back up, but the driver hit him again, flipping the flagger up on top of the hood. According to witnesses, the driver got out of his car and started cussing the man. Bystanders managed to get the car keys but the driver took them back and drove off. Another driver in the lineup lost his cool and tried to pass other cars, but this driver managed to hit the flagger – luckily, without hurting him too bad. Police caught up with both drivers, but the real wonder: the flagman stayed on his post for the remainder of the run.
